

APRIL PASTOR'S CORNER...



Let us not forget the reason for the season. Every year following the first Passover in Egypt, Moses commanded the people to set aside a time of celebration, to remind them of God's defeat of Pharaoh and their return to the Promised land. When we celebrated Christmas, we were in fact reminding ourselves and others of the importance of Christ coming into our world as a baby, born like us, but without the sin baggage we carry.

The month of April in Minnesota can be a time of rain as we move from the season of winter into the season of spring. So it is with the seasons of the church. We are fast approaching Holy Week and the celebration of Easter. What was prophesied by God in Genesis 3:15 (a Savior) was accomplished for us two thousand years ago.

We will conclude the season of Lent on April 12 and begin the Holy Week of our faith. During that week, we remind ourselves and others of the final words of Jesus, the suffering and brutality He endured physically and spiritually that was evident against an innocent man, and the complete miscarriage of justice by the religious and civil leaders.



As we stand before the cross today, we realize that our sins put Him there. Our punishment was ours alone to carry. In love He carried our sins, since we are unable to do it ourselves.

Christmas is a season of giving. God gave us His Son as our Savior. The season of Easter is about giving too. Jesus, as the Son of God, gave up His earthly life so that you and I might live. When He died on that eerie darkened Friday of Passover, your sins were paid for. His blood covered your sins as a gift of grace.

The celebration on Easter Sunday is God's Way of saying all things have been accomplished as I said it would be. When Jesus arose from the dead He was given new life. In the same token, with faith in Him, you will receive a new life as well. Your sins are now forgiven, and you will enter heaven for all eternity.

April 12 this year marks the end of Lent. This year it also marks the beginning of Passover. We have an even greater celebration planned at the 10:30 Palm Sunday service. The Sunday school children will process with palms to sing on the steps of the chancel. Eight confirmands will follow them. We remind ourselves of the Holy Week procession of our Lord and Savior Christ Jesus. The sacrificial Passover Lamb of God comes to claim His victory over sin, death, and the Devil. It will be a busy few weeks ahead, but worth it.

n May 4, during the Sunday Bible class hour (9:30-10:15), we will be offering "The First Bible" class for parents of 2nd graders.


Students who attend these classes will receive a free Bible of their own.







ow! Where has the time gone? We are in mid-March (as of this writing) of 2025 already! It seems the older I get, the faster the time goes.

I apologize for not getting this information together sooner. It's been a bit busy. But I wanted to give you an overview of 2023 and 2024 and where we see the Radio Club in 2025 and beyond.

In 2021, we received a wonderful gift from a longtime listener who passed away and remembered the Radio Club and the Faribault Area Lutheran Hour in her will.

The broadcast of the Lutheran Hour will be able to

continue for many years in the future because of this generosity. It costs us about \$3,900 yearly to broadcast the Lutheran Hour on KDHL. The broadcast, which comes from St. Louis, is played every Sunday at 6:00 p.m.

on KDHL. We invite you to listen!

As for the Radio Club, we need people to join us. You don't necessarily need to work up in the radio room. We need people to take an interest in what we do and help us plan and execute the ministry. Since the pandemic, the Radio Club has just had a couple of us as "members." We'd like to reconstitute the group and make it more formal again. Please talk to Dustin Grund or me if you want to join us!

So, what have we been up to in the last couple of years?

A lot has been happening. Here are a few things that we have been involved with:

 Researched and purchased (with donated funds for church technology) a new 85" monitor installed over the center entrance door to the sanctuary. This allows the pastor and choir to view service slides and follow along with the service. With massive thanks to Steve Denninger and the team that helped, this was installed and is now in use.

- Repainted the radio room.
- Put up a new drop ceiling in the radio room.
- Purchased and installed four new remotecontrolled high-definition cameras, replacing our low-definition cameras.
- Cleaned up wiring in the tray above the windows in the back of the church.
- Purchased and installed new Starlink satellite internet for the radio room, giving us higher bandwidth and much less downtime for our live streams and broadcast to KDHL.
- Purchased and are building new computer equipment to allow us to manage more inputs and out-

puts in the future.

• Moved from transmitter and antenna to Voice Over IP (sending our audio via the internet) to KDHL.

Financially, our listeners and the congre-

gation members have been doing a fantastic job remembering the Radio Club. Our broadcast fees are now nearly \$12,000 per year with KDHL. We ask that you remember the Radio Club in your prayers and with your gifts and memorials.

Lastly, I apologize for not getting the thank you cards out promptly. That falls on me, and I'm working to get caught up and get those notices out. We certainly appreciate the gifts we receive and want to ensure everyone is acknowledged.

We always seek people to help us with all three services. Please consider volunteering to assist us.

From Your Financial Manager...

AFTER EIGHTEEN YEARS, TRINITY NOW HAS A NEW FINANCIAL MANAGER

t seems like I've been in the office here for half of my life. Well, not that long, it just seems that way because I'm getting older. But it has been a long time, about eighteen years now. And yes, it is high time for me to retire. It's both a good time and a sad time for me. It's good because my eyesight has been getting worse for me over the last couple of years, and I'm ready to take it easier now. But it's a sad time because I have really enjoyed doing this job over the years, and I have made many friends here as a part of it. Together, I think we have accomplished a lot over the years. Of course, I'll still be around; I'm not planning on going anywhere after retirement.

Eighteen years is a long time, and I've been thinking lately about what all happened over that time. As you may re-

call, we had just started Policy Based Governance just before 2007 but the structure of our boards recommended by the consultant wasn't complete at first. Such things as the Board Elders and some sort of business overseer besides the pastor himself weren't yet a part of the system. Pastor Kuehne felt we needed a Business Manager to take care of church operations so the pastor could concentrate on preaching and teaching, which is what he felt pastors are trained for and are generally best at.

Such a person would report to the Senior Pastor who, in turn, would report to the LLB. My previous experience in engineering made me feel I might be qualified for such a job and would be something I would enjoy. Pastor Kuehne apparently agreed, and so I began the position in 2007. The LLB told all the church staff, including the pastor, that all staff members needed an advisory group to support them so in my case, for properties, that's how the Property Committee began.

For the financial side, I worked with the Office Manager, first Kathy Bode, and then Jennie, as a supportive team, one to another. This method, worked well, creating a cross-referencing system, checking over each other's work in every detail so as to form a secure local financial network.

Throughout the years, Kathy, Jennie and I have worked well together, and I believe have maintained that secure structure.


As far as properties are concerned, over the years large lists of improvements have been done on our buildings and infrastructure. Much of the work was done by the members of the Property Committee in addition to their valuable advice and job knowledge. Plus, thanks to the generosity of our members who donated a lot of money over the years for improvements, we had the money for many projects, both big and small, such as our new boiler system, upgraded forced air furnaces and air conditioners, the upgrading of our underground piping complex, including the elimination of all asbestos, plus our new church office area.

Writing policies was also a part of the job. Since 2007, I wrote a series of policies, including steps on maintaining the churches funds and records, our inclement weather policy, health crisis policy, and the employee manual.

Well before 2007, our church had fallen deeply into long-term debt. Through the skilled leadership of several of our church leaders and through amazing support from the entire congregation, we managed to eliminate the entire

debt of more than \$350,000 in a relatively short time. As a part of this, we also had to trim down our spending in order to stay within our means. So one of my goals as Business Manager was to make sure we never went into long-term debt again. And except for the pre-planned loan associated with the new church offices, we have held to the zero debt policy. A part of that was continuously supplying the membership with up-to-date financial information so everyone knew where we sat. That didn't mean there wasn't a time we wound up in the red at the end of the year, but that wasn't loan debt. That was our General Fund getting depleted down to a dangerous level.

And always, through God's loving guidance and our understanding of necessary stewardship, we have always found ways to build our funds back up to a sustainable level again.

And even though we have all heard negative comments about some of our buildings, especially about the school stack building, the consultant who came in for the consolidation process told us he was very impressed with the way we keep up our buildings throughout our campus. And around ten years ago, when FLS was looking for options for site alternatives and we had structural engineers come and evaluate both the Peace and Trinity campuses, their final reports said that both Trinity's and Peace's buildings were all structurally sound and in good shape. And, of course,

we have all heard many positive comments about our outdoor upkeep.

Yes, God has been good to us. We have managed to stay on an even keel for many years now both in terms of fiscal health and in terms of building maintenance, I have no doubt that will continue with the help of both our new Financial Coordinator and Property Manager. We will continue to keep things, whether as ourselves or as Faribault Lutheran Church, in good financial and physically secure, as God expects of us.
