OCTOBER PASTOR'S CORNER...

hange is in the air. We celebrated a time of equal daylight and nighttime hours on Monday, September 22.

Once in awhile you can step outside and smell that rain is coming. I had that experience just the other day, and by evening we had a deluge of rain.

Those who live on the West coast of the United States may awaken and feel the shake of an earthquake. They know from experience that others may follow. The local authorities respond to this disaster as needed.

How do we respond to tragic evil events across our state and our country? Minnesota has been in the national limelight for a senseless shooting at a Catholic school in Minneapolis. Our country mourned the loss of Charlie Kirk on Sunday, September 21.

It does not matter our political leanings, taking the life of another human being is still sinful and wrong. An opponent of Abraham Lincoln took his life in 1865—160 years ago. Others took the lives of James A. Garfield (1881), William McKinley (1901), and John F. Kennedy (1963). Other important people in the 1960's faced a similar fate, Robert F. Kennedy (1968) and Martin Luther King (1968).

The 1960's were a time of unrest in the land both politically and spiritually. So how do we respond to this latest unrest in our land? We stand ready to minister, as we always have, to the ones looking for answers to life's questions. We worship the God of the universe who created us and sustains us. We draw them to the cross and the hope of salvation despite the wickedness in the world that surrounds us.

We show them the God who loves them and cares for them by offering His Son Jesus as a sacrifice for their sin. We share that despite sin in the world Jesus arose to new life. He promises that same gift of grace to all who believe in His name. God can forgive the errant sins of a person if they turn to Him before death, no matter how great or small in our eyes.

Let us have a month of prayer. Let us get on our knees asking God for a spiritual revival in our land. Young and old alike have been distracted over the years living life to the fullest. When life comes up short in their eyes, we have the answers. It's not by harsh words but by the love of Jesus.

Paul directs Timothy with this Bible verse, but it is good for us to consider. "Preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching" (2 Tim. 4:2).

We can't control the weather in Minnesota. By experience we do know what's coming. We have learned to get prepared and ready for the next season. God has put us strategically in this place and at this time to share the gospel of Jesus.

A great song written years ago says it all. "What the world needs now is love, sweet love. It's the only thing that there's just too little of. What the world needs now is love, sweet love. No, not just for some but for everyone." *

The love of God surpasses any and all rulers, kings, and evil acts of man. For, He is timeless and knows the heart of man. "But showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments" (Exodus 20:6).



If God is for love, then we also need to be a people of love who pray for our enemies that they might turn to Jesus in these unsettling times. In the end, the mission of God "desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:4).

Be in prayer and be ready to share your faith, not in harshness or judgement, but in love and mercy. Amen.




got hot! About 60 people attend this event on a hot day.




Create a simple and meaningful prayer box your family can use to share requests and pray together all week long.

NUMBERING OUR DAYS



o fix what they call a disorganized date-tracking system, professors
Steve Hanke and Dick Henry have developed a "permanent calendar."

On it, January 1 is always a Monday, so holidays and birthdays occur on the same day every year. The 364-day calendar eliminates leap years, time zones, Halloween and every Friday the 13th. Instead of leap days, "every five or six years, we'll have an extra week at the end [of December] when you can party," says Henry. Because the permanent cal-

endar is predictable, it reportedly would save money and time. Yet despite almost two decades of work, the idea hasn't taken off.

However we track our lives, we do well to remember this prayer: "Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations. ... Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:1, 12 NIV).

church goer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. He wrote: "I've gone for 30 years now, and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons, but for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. WORK AND KEEP

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and keep it" (Genesis 2:15).

enesis chapters one and two are familiar to us. We know them best as the Creation Account. Chapter one is where we hear the familiar, "let there be...and there was" directives. Chapter two gives us the account of Adam (the man) being formed from the "Adamah" (the dust) and becoming a living being when he receives the breath of life in his nostrils. Because of this, it would be quite easy to simply lump these two chapters into the category of creation accounts.

But do not be too hasty in this! While these two chapters do faithfully relate to us the account of creation, they also give us the creation of the "office" of steward. The man, created in the image of God in Genesis 1 and formed from the dust in Genesis 2, is created for a distinct purpose. He is created to be a steward of the perfect and beautiful creation that the Lord has made! In fact, this is THE reason that man was made. He — and we — were created in the image of God to be stewards of God's creation.

This purpose is spelled out in verse 15 of Genesis 2. The steward has one job, with two purposes. . . .

The first purpose of the job of steward is to work. The steward is the caretaker of the Garden. Being a steward is work! Before the fall into sin, this was not an onerous task. But it was an active thing.

Imagine being a farmer in the Garden of Eden! Work would be only harvest. No plowing. No planting. No cultivating. No weeding. The perfect garden that the Lord had made would simply produce automatically to provide for man, woman, and all living beings!

But there is a second task in verse fifteen. The word "keep" is not just a synonym for work. This second task is related to defending. This garden, holy by virtue of its being called into existence by a holy God, needed to be

defended. Here is where the vocation of steward becomes priestly. The steward was to defend the perfect and holy garden from that which was unholy. Later in the Old Testament, this was the task of the priests in the tabernacle and temple. They were to defend with their lives the Holy of Holies. This too is the labor of stewardship. It is a labor that calls the steward to be willing to put the garden before life!

Stewardship was always work. It only got burdensome after the original steward, Adam, failed to defend the garden from the alien word of the serpent. But this was not a failure of harvest. It was a failure to defend the garden! As a result, all work that followed that failure became burdensome.

The steward failed but was never fired. That is why we have such an issue with stewardship to this day. We continue to live out a pre-fall vocation in a fallen world as failed stewards. That is why we in the church need to be reminded of our vocational call to be stewards. We so easily forget that this world is not ours to do with as we please. Nothing is ours. We are but stewards entrusted with managing the creation for the glory of God and the benefit of the neighbor.

It is a daunting task. But it is the one to which we have been called. We cannot do it on our own. Apart from the grace of God shared with us through Jesus, we would be burdened to the point of temporal and eternal death. But the Holy Spirit calls us by the Gospel! This Gospel connects us to the fertile garden of Christ's Work on our behalf. Now we are stewards of that grace! The Holy Spirit works this in and through us today and every day. This is the work of the church. It is also the work of the individual steward. The Lord has placed us in the "garden" with the same twofold purpose: work and keep! Enjoy your labor. For in the Lord, our labor is never in vain!
